October Deadlines:

October 12 - Loran Scholarship - First Scholarship of the Year - The Loran Scholarship is valued at \$100,000 over 4 years, but there are various levels of this award to be given out. Deadline for applications is Oct. 11. Have a look at the attached website:

The selection of a Loran Scholar is unique in its attention to a young person's character. They believe that *integrity*, *courage*, *grit and personal autonomy* are better indicators of overall potential than standard academic measures.

- Be in your final year of uninterrupted full-time studies in high school.
- Present a minimum cumulative average of 85%.
- Hold Canadian citizenship or permanent resident status.
- Be at least 16 years of age by September 1st of the following year.

October 31 - Horatio Alger Canadian Scholarship - To be eligible to apply for the Horatio Alger Canadian Scholarship, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Exhibit a strong commitment to pursue and complete a bachelor's degree program at an accredited university
- Demonstrate critical financial need (\$65,000 or less annual net income per family is required)
- Be involved in co-curricular and community service activities
- Display integrity and perseverance in overcoming adversity
- Maintain a minimum grade percentage of
- Attend high school (or CEGEP) and reside in Canada
- Be Canadian citizens




BLAZER BEEF SUPPER

"HELP MY CHILD" Panel Discussion topics/speakers will include:

- 1. What is Home & School? David Schult, Former international school teacher and administrator having worked overseas for over 24 years, in seven countries before returning to Canada in 2021, will provide background and context to what Home and School is and does.
- 2. COMPASS Student Health Survey! Cody Davenport, PEI COMPASS Research Project Lead, PEI Chief Public Health Office, will present student health survey results about their health and health behaviours including sedentary behaviours, physical activity, mental health, healthy eating, substance use, bullying, academic outcomes, and sleep.
